Scripture Reading "Peace be with you." Read John 20.19-29

Meditation For this week and the three weeks that will follow, we will be considering what it means to have courage through the eyes of different individuals in the Bible. The first person we consider is certainly not at the top of most lists when we begin to name those whose courage comes readily to mind. Despite that, his life – and his faith – is well-known.

The disciple Thomas wasn't with friends in the "upper room" after Jesus' crucifixion and so he missed the Savior's first post-resurrection appearance. We can only imagine how sad Thomas must have been to have missed him, especially as the other disciples rejoiced and talked on and on about it. But, when Jesus returned a week later, Thomas WAS there and wasted no time in clearly stating his need to see the scars in Jesus' hands and side for himself.

Once again, as Jesus did so often with those he met, the Risen Christ met this disciple on his own terms - right where he was, confused as he was. And Jesus encouraged him: "Put your finger

here, and look at my hands; then reach out your hand and put it in my side. Stop your doubting and believe."

Thomas is the disciple that has been given such a bad name through the years and all because he dared to ask a few questions and to be vulnerable in front of his friends. In addition, Thomas was able to admit his need to understand what was going on. That's pretty courageous, isn't it? I don't know about you but I know that I'm not always that courageous.

That said, I'm not sure that Thomas deserves the reputation he's been given through the centuries. And, in addition, his reaction to Jesus' appearance makes sense if we stop and think about it. After all, Thomas had seen Jesus offer signs and perform miracles so that his disciples could begin to understand who he was and what he was capable of and Thomas just expected Jesus to do the same again.

In fact Thomas had already seen someone come back to life; he had been present with other disciples when Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. But this upper room was different. Thomas knew implications of what he was seeing. For Jesus was not only alive but is also God! Of course the other disciples saw that Jesus was alive; however, think about today's gospel reading. Thomas is the only one of the twelve who proclaims "My Lord and my God," proving that this disciple - even in the midst of his questions was a true believer.

Thomas - perhaps more than any of Jesus' disciples - witnessed to his faith in whose he was and where he was going as he accepted the amazing reality of the resurrection and proclaimed Jesus as his savior.

Thomas wasn't the doubter that he has been proclaimed to be throughout the ages. Rather, Thomas had the courage to boldly ask his questions and express his need for proof and, as a result, he could courageously and boldly proclaim his faith as well!
