Meditation The story of the blind man, Bartimaeus. It's one of my very favorite stories. God brought it to my mind at a time when I needed to know God's comfort, when I needed Jesus to say to me, "What do you want me to do for you?"

That was Bartimaeus' request and, given the culture he was in, it's a miracle, really, that he was able to answer Jesus' question. Jesus and the disciples had come to Jericho; as they walked out of the city with Jesus, as Mark's gospel tells us, a large crowd was gathered around them. There was a blind beggar sitting by the roadside as they departed and, when this man learned that it was Jesus who was passing by, he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me." When the crowd hushed him, he shouted even louder, determined to be heard.


Can you imagine the reaction of the disciples and the crowd? Here was a beggar – of all people – shouting for Jesus! As if Jesus was going to pay attention to him in all the noise and confusion, let alone do so given who he was. That's not the way their society worked! So it's no surprise that the crowd told this poor man to be quiet. The people following Jesus were too busy to listen to this beggar; Jesus might have a pearl of wisdom to share or – dare they expect – he might even want to walk to one of them! What an honor that would be!!

But Jesus had other plans for he DID hear Bartimaeus above the din of the crowd. It was as if his ears tuned right into the one who needed him the most. That's so like Jesus, isn't it?

And so Jesus stood still and, to the amazement of those gathered around him, called to Bartimaeus. No way, those experiencing this must have thought. There's no way that Jesus is calling this beggar, is there? But, indeed he was for Jesus had a very important question to ask this man in need: "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asked him with love and compassion. As the crowd looked on, seeing how intently Jesus looked at this beggar and how much love he had for him, Bartimaeus said with great courage, "My teacher, let me see again." And it was so. Jesus proclaimed to him that his faith had made him well.

Oh, if those around Bartimaeus could have seen as clearly as he did, even being blind. Those in crowd had walked right by him, ignoring his needs, forgetting to act like Christ in reaching out to help him. When Jesus asks us what he can do for each of us, as he does each and every day, may we ask him to open our eyes and our hearts to the needs of those around us and so bear witness to the power of Christ for each of us.
