Scripture Reading *“...stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near.”* Read Luke 21.25-36

Meditation As we gather this week with family and friends to celebrate the day of Thanksgiving, we give thanks that we continue to navigate these pandemic days but also offer God the prayer that they will soon be over. We are weary of the anxiety Covid has caused; we just want to be “normal” again. For those reasons, we are excited that the season of Advent begins this Sunday for we are more than ready to think about all things “Christmasy.”

The Scripture readings for this first Sunday in this brand new Christian year, however, don’t sound like Christmas at all. No angels, no animals in a manger, no cuddly baby destined to be the Savior of the world. Today’s readings are far removed from the festivities of the Christmas season. That’s because this First Sunday of Advent shares a focus much different than that of December 25th. On this day we read of a darkened sun, a moon

with no light, and stars falling from the skys! Wait, what??!

Luke's gospel outlines what the time will look like when Christ will come again. That also is a time of watching and waiting, just as we are doing in the season of Advent. However, instead of our anticipation of the Christ Child, we anticipate when Jesus, as our Savior, comes to usher in the Kingdom of God. Our readings of the gospel of Mark for the weeks leading up to the start of Advent have helped us focus on the Kingdom and how, as we wait, we should be living as Jesus' faithful disciples.

Lest we think that this week's gospel is all gloom and doom, remember that Jesus shares a story in the midst of these words, the story of the fig tree. That story resembles the current scene outside our windows: the trees are bare and settling in for their winter rest. Before we know it, the buds will begin and, in due time, the leaves will blossom and we will be surrounded with newness once again. I love this resting time of year; as the earth rests, we are filled with anticipation that it will come to life in the months ahead. We can't pinpoint that exact time – as it is with the Kingdom which Jesus will bring. Therefore, we are asked to faithfully wait and love God and one another, as Christ admonishes us to do.

Philip Brooks wrote the words to a beloved carol, *O Little Town of Bethlehem*, that speaks to the Advent time of waiting to celebrate the Christ child and the waiting for God's Kingdom: *"How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given! So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven. No ear may hear his coming, but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him, still the dear Christ enters in."* May the blessings of this holy time be yours as we watch and wait in faith.

Words of Benediction Our journey to Bethlehem has begun, and soon God's glory will be fully revealed. We watch, we wait, and we anticipate Christ's coming into our lives. May the light of God's glory shine brightly in our lives as we go forth into the world of God's creation as beacons of hope, proclaiming the coming of Christ. We go with God's blessing in this holy season.
