In Genesis 1.28-30 we read: God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so.

God created order doesn't revolve around humanity alone. Here, after giving human beings the command to have dominion over all other living things, God demonstrates what that dominion shall look like – and it doesn't look like domination or control.

God points out the provisions for human sustenance – the seeds for planting, the fruit for harvesting – then adds that the animals have been given food as well. God has created the earth to sustain human life and animal life so that they are not competing for resources. God has made it clear that caring for these creatures will mean understanding the inter-

dependence that exists in the human/animal relationship. It is left to humans to maintain this delicate balance. Dominion, then, includes this element of care, of ensuring that the earth continues to provide for ALL living creatures.

Let us pray: Merciful God, we consume without consideration for the impact we have on those creatures we are called to care for. Forgive us for our recklessness in how we interact with your creation. Restore us to our place as caretakers of creation as we work to recalibrate the balance between human benefit and creation care.

May we give more prayerful thought to God's creation all around us and do our part to be caregivers of all that God entrusts to us.

LAY LEADER REPORT

I hope this finds you all in good spirits. Not only is this greeting a Halloween reference, but it is an invitation to examine your spiritual life. How is it going? Do you still feel isolated and discouraged? Please know that our church is there for you. We have your back. We can share our worries with each other.

I recently attended a webinar given by the United Women of Faith. The speaker was Rebecca Simon-Peter. She spoke with care and enthusiastic energy about her book, Forging a New Path. I have not read it yet, but I intend to.

Ms. Simon-Peter's scriptural reference is Ezekiel 37:1-10. This is when the Lord commands the dry bones to rise. She also points to historic events such as the bubonic plague. During that time the isolation period was thirty days! When that happened the isolation was given a sort of Lenten context.

Ms. Simon-Peter pointed out that positive things happened during the pandemic; we rediscovered creativity and generosity, we discovered our gratitude for people, we discovered how much we need one another. When the world slowed down, pollution was reduced and wildlife reemerged. We found that some meetings were unnecessary. We developed relationships in the church and with our neighbors.

Ms. Simon-Peter talked about what to do with our anger and the continuing conflicts around politics. She said we should focus on the church and ethics. We should concentrate on human kindness. We should learn to be careful with our language. We should obey the golden rule and what she calls the platinum rule. Treat others as we would like to be treated and find out how people would like to be treated. In this way we can use our spirituality to become more inclusive, drawing people in from the margins. Like Ezekiel, we can allow God to breathe life into those dry bones. We can let the spirit be the divine light within us.

I just finished a book called <u>The Virtual Body of Christ in a Suffering World</u> by Deanna Thompson. To be honest, I wasn't sure I wanted to learn more about the virtual church, but I found this book to be very enlightening. Ms. Thompson leads the reader through her own resistance to the use of virtual connections to her acceptance of what these connections can give us.

One of the things that became evident to Ms. Thompson showed the wideness of the church through virtual reality. She experienced a severe illness-stage four breast cancer-and as she reached out to her church and support groups she made connections across the globe. People shared her need on social media, and the number of people praying for her was astonishing. She also pointed out that people who are ill may not want to see others face to face. The person may be embarrassed about showing weakness or feel that they do not look dignified.

LAY LEADER REPORT, CONT.

The person may be undergoing treatments that have uncomfortable side effects. (We all are aware of covid and the restrictions on visiting those who are ill. Virtual church can serve as an alternative.) Use of the internet can cross those boundaries and still offer comfort and care. This is another dimension of Christ and culture.

Ms. Thompson points to the letters of Paul as an example of communication that was distinctive and innovative. Paul sent messengers with letters to the people he was pastoring. He reached out to members of the body of Christ remotely. (I find this akin to a large zoom call.) In this way Christ is present virtually to the followers of Paul, just as we allow Christ to be present through our Facebook posts and our Sunday morning live stream. If you check out our Facebook page and look to the morning services, you can see how many views there have been. I noticed that the longer the service is posted, the more views there are. For example, at this writing, last Sunday's views were 57 and August 28th had 63 views. Then, on August 21st, there were 82 views! It's exciting to think that we have reached out to that many people, not to mention the people attending church in person.

Ms. Thompson uses the story of Blind Bartimaeus to show how Jesus stops and attends to a person needing care, comfort, and healing. Jesus allows himself to be interrupted to care for a person outside of his usual circle. Bartimaeus is a person who is not considered worthy of attention. Jesus refused to abide by the prevailing sentiment and responded to Bartimaeus. Ms. Thompson's point is that we are often interrupted by digital communications. It is up to us to notice a person in need. All of God's children are worthy of attention.

I found both of these books and their authors very affirming. We are a church that is on the right track! We have found creative ways to reach out to people using virtual church. We are the body of Christ doing God's work in our church, community, and the world. Although we don't use it much in worship, the Apostle's Creed states:

I believe in the Holy Spirit,

The holy catholic church, (note the small c indicating the church universal)

The communion of saints,

The forgiveness of sins,

The resurrection of the body

And the life everlasting. Amen.

A woman from California was visiting her parents who live locally and decided to participate in our event. She shared her wonderful story with me after the race that I wish to share with you: She told me that it was her first race in several years after sustaining an injury to one of her knees. The doctors, at the time, told her they'd done what they could to repair the damage so she could walk, but would never be able to run again. This was devasting news for her as she had been a competitive runner for many years. Well, after going through physical therapy and self-rehab, she was able to run in our event! Her enthusiasm was infectious and she was so proud of her accomplishment in proving the doctors wrong. I was moved by her story and awarded her an extra medal that I had so that she would always remember us and mark the day she ran a race again. One could tell that God was working with her every step of the way and leading her to our event to share her good news!

Other runners complimented us on the fact that all of the proceeds go to the charitable organization, ("Warm Thy Neighbor") and not shared with some professional event management company. Several also offered additional donations because of that fact. We thanked them at the time and I thank all of you who donated money to the event and, ultimately, to our neighbors in need. A total of the donation to Tedford Housing has yet to be determined (possibly near \$1,800), but I wanted to share this story of how our small event can impact the participants as well as the recipients, and, again, express, on behalf of the 5K team, our appreciation for your support of this event.
