AND MUCH MORE!

Hear the beautiful words of Psalm 8:

- <sup>1</sup>O LORD, our Sovereign, how majestic is your name in all the earth! You have set your glory above the heavens.
- <sup>2</sup> Out of the mouths of babes and infants you have founded a bulwark because of your foes, to silence the enemy and the avenger.
- <sup>3</sup> When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; <sup>4</sup> what are humans that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them?
- <sup>5</sup> Yet you have made them a little lower than God and crowned them with glory and honor.
- <sup>6</sup> You have given them dominion over the works of your hands; you have put all things under their feet, <sup>7</sup> all sheep and oxen, and also the beasts of the field,
- <sup>8</sup> the birds of the air, and the fish of the sea, whatever passes along the paths of the seas. <sup>9</sup>O LORD, our Sovereign, how majestic is your name in all the earth!

As this psalm begins and ends, the psalmist addresses God as "our Sovereign." This acknowledges that God is in all and above all, creating all that is and all that will be.

In his book, A Wesleyan Spiritual Reader, author Rueben P. Job speaks to God's sovereignty when he writes,

"In a world of almost instant communication and graphic story-telling about the tragedy and pain of the world, it is easy to forget this ancient truth: God is sovereign and therefore God is able to care for and provide for all of creation.

Once we lose the concept of God as sovereign, our prayers, our faith, and our very souls begin to shrink. To believe in a severely limited God takes the heart out of reverence and out of prayer.

From the very beginning, Methodism's founder John Wesley was clear about the sovereignty of God. He never doubted God's ability to care for and provide for all that God had created. Because God is sovereign, then we can pray confidently and boldly for the redemption of the world, the conversion of evil to good,

This replaced the original resolution (also RS-23-221) that had set time limits on the debate of each disaffiliation (taken separately).

During the post-dinner session, members continued the work on the resolution around disaffiliations. The resolutions brought by the 14 churches were voted on in one motion, which was overwhelmingly approved by the body. The Appointive Cabinet offered a prayer following the vote.

Bishop Johnson reminded the body that the disaffiliations were not complete until each of the church's met the obligations outlined in the agreements. They have until Dec. 31, 2023 to do that. The church members and clergy as still part of the annual conference until that happens. The bishop read the churches' names and offered a prayer.

#### Recognitions

Bishop Peggy Johnson took a moment to recognize and thank Rev. Ashely Johnson, who served as Director of Connectional Ministries from July 1, 2021 to Dec. 31, 2022. Johnson is not able to attend on Saturday, when the incoming Cabinet members, new DCM will be recognized.

Acting Treasurer and Director of Administrative Services Clare J. Chapman, spoke about some of the changes in the conference's administrative structure. The seven part-time district administrative assistant positions will become four full-time positions with the title Regional Administrator.

Allyson Printz — Commonwealth East and West districts

The fourth position, covering the Seacoast District and providing support to the Director of Connectional Ministries, has not yet been filled.
