LAY LEADER REPORT

Greetings! I hope you are ready for September. The church is gearing up with a few activities; The Neighbors Helping Neighbors 5K, a church yard and book sale, and lots of meetings. Soon the choir will be joining us in worship.

Please give some thought to getting together for a Bible Study Group. I welcome your input as to what type of study you would like and when would be a good time-morning, afternoon, evening-what day of the week, etc. Do you want to use a book as a guide, or would you like to dig deeper into Sunday's scripture? I have a Faith and Facts resource from the Church and Society group that has discussion ideas. I will bring it to church for you to look at. May was Asian and Pacific Islanders heritage month. I didn't get a chance to write about it, because of New England Annual Conference. I attended a zoom group generated at Rolling Ridge featuring Rep. Tram Nguyen of Massachusetts. He spoke about the Asian immigration to work on the construction of the railroad in 1843. He also talked of his own experience as a Vietnamese immigrant. His family, along with many others, were political refugees. He came to the US and settled in Boston in 1992. They lived in public housing in Lawrence, MA and were sponsored by a host family. There were many challenges, especially language and culture. When Tram began first grade, he didn't speak English. Tram's father valued education highly, feeling that education is the key to success. (You may have noticed this value as part of Vietnamese culture.) Tram was bullied and teased and felt ashamed. His father taught him not to let his power be taken away. His parents were hard workers, with multiple jobs and long hours. Tram was motivated to become a lawyer with good pay, in order to help his family. In law school Tram learned of the power of policy, leading him to run for state representative. In Massachusetts, most Vietnamese live in Dorchester. They use the power of community to work for their rights, such as bilingual education.

Vietnamese cuisine includes Pho, a noodle soup, fresh vegetables and herbs, rice, seafood, and egg rolls.

Tram spoke about the current immigration situation. He talked about the sacrifices made, and separation from family. He called this the long goodbye. He described how people left unlivable circumstances to come to a new country for a better life. He advocates for a welcoming country. He pointed out that the investment is in people, with humanity getting much in return, such as skills and intellect. Tram talked about the Asian Hate Movement which uses violence and abuse toward Asian people. He has worked with community leaders and sponsored hate crime legislation. He advocates for schools teaching inclusivity, teaching about stories and value instead of racism. He spoke about lack of housing, (we in Maine are well aware of this issue and the placement of asylum seekers as they wait the six months before they can attain work visas.)

Tram spoke of other issues such as trafficking, access to unemployment, minimum wage, and workers compensation. He also works on water quality, animal protection, mental health, and the opioid crisis. He advocates for diversity and inclusion, listening to voices speak for themselves. Many immigrants have a fear of the government, and Tram is working to dispel that. Tram also works for the environment, working toward more green spaces, outdoor activities, camps, and activities at Rolling Ridge.

He encourages more people of color and diverse backgrounds to work in and with the state government.

I am just finishing a book by Celeste Ng (Little Fires Everywhere, Everything I Never Told You). It is called Our Missing Hearts. I highly recommend it. It is one of those "what if" books. The premise is that there is an economic crisis, and Asians are blamed. Racism becomes government policy. The book tells the tale of a family and how they are affected. No spoilers! Books I have read over the summer:

The Intersectional Enviornmentalist by Leah Thomas

The Seven Deadly Sins of White Nationalism by Carter Heyward

Forging a New Path by Rebekah Simon-Peter

I hope that as we enter the fall (my favorite) season, we find the strength of the spirit to continue to do God's work.
