A "Straight Ahead Focus"

James Moore, a popular United Methodist study author whose stories we have heard in sermons and whose books our Bible study groups have read through the years, shares an experience from his youth when he was a sprinter on his Memphis high school track team.

Moore was a freshman on the team and had been competing in short events when one day his coach suddenly decided to put him into the 220 yard dash. He told Moore that he thought he would do well, in fact, he told him that he was expecting he would win this event.

"This is a 'full-speed-all-the-way race,' the coach told Jim. "Focus on getting a good start, then run as fast as you can."

Moore did win that 220-yard dash but the coach called him into his office the next day. He congratulated Jim and said he wanted Jim to continue to represent the team in this event in future meets.

BUT the coach told him that he made a terrible mistake - one that almost cost him the race. Moore didn't know what the coach was talking about. "You ran the last twenty yards twice," said the coach. "You looked back over your shoulder twice and broke stride. You stumbled and almost lost the race."

The coach showed Moore the film of the race so that he could see it for himself. "The lesson here is obvious," commented the coach. "Don't look back over your shoulder ever again. Keep your eyes focused straight ahead on the finish line."

We can apply Moore's coach's advice to our journeys of faith. First, it is a "full-speed-all-the-way" journey as we seek to follow the example of Jesus each and every day, never giving up and never giving in to the temptations that will challenge us. And, second, it's important to keep our eyes focused on the Kingdom of God – the Kingdom we live in this life as disciples for Christ and the Kingdom we are promised for the world which is to come.

May God continue to guide you on your journey as we continue to run the race with perseverance and faithfulness.

FROM YOUR LAY LEADER

Greetings from your Lay Leader! As I write this, it feels like spring and summer will never come. However, even though it is cold and rainy, vegetation is turning green and flowers are blooming. God is good, and I have faith that the warm days will come.

As Methodists, we have foundational beliefs that undergird our faith. Our founder, John Wesley, taught about the quadrilateral. What is that? The quadrilateral emphasizes four sources of authority: Scripture, tradition, reason, and experience. It guides us to understanding and interpretation of Christian faith.

Other theologians have written about similar groundings of their faith. Father Richard Rohr describes the foundations and the tricycle of faith. Just as when you ride a tricycle, all three wheels are needed to stay balanced. In one article he emphasizes (just as Wesley did) the importance of Tradition. Tradition includes wisdom, beliefs, practices, prayers, and rituals.

We can rely on our tradition to help us remember our role in God's world and plan. It's easy to get distracted by things happening along the way. But, we must remember that tradition teaches us to do God's work. It is up to us to do the work! When we find that things are not happening in a way that feeds the hungry and supports the marginalized, we must step up and do what is needed. Saint Theresa taught that a small handful of rice goes a long way. As we do the small things, they begin to add up to big things. We can experience the miracle of the loaves and fishes as we feed our neighbors. We can spread God's love as we welcome all of God's children just as Jesus did. Just as we do for the least of these, we do for Jesus. We rely on the scripture and our traditions to find strength in time of need.

Showing kindness to others is a way to spread God's love. It's amazing what a little bit of caring can do. I experienced this myself today. Harvey and I took his mother out to lunch for her 95th(!) birthday. The staff at the restaurant were very kind, patient, and helpful as I settled them in for the meal. I had to run back to the car to get reading glasses, and the waiter touched my arm and indicated he would watch over them until I got back. That small gesture filled me with peace and helped me relax and enjoy our time together. Now I know that I need to pass it on. So, here I am reaching out to you as you read this.

FROM LACO

The Good Shepherd Food Bank will receive 50% less food from USDA with government cuts. The immigrant farm program that gives food pantries and schools fresh produce is eliminated. The Church Council voted at their last meeting to put the LACO food collection box back out to help collect food. If you shop at Food City, there is a bin to drop of food. Major needs are peanut butter, pastas, cereals (especially kids' cereals), canned fruits and vegetables or any other foods you would like to donate. Outreach is still collecting items for the Children's Christmas Shop fundraiser for LACO in December. It allows kids to shop on their own while parents wait in the sanctuary. It is held at St. Matthews Episcopal Church. Kids pay \$1.00 for items for their family members, and they are wrapped and tagged so they are a surprise for the family members. We have collected 69 items so far. Last year 79 children shopped for gifts for their family members.

On June 7th, we will be having the annual Car Show with the Yankee Cruisers Car Club at Shiloh Chapel in Durham. It will run from 8-2. We are asking the churches of LACO to provide snack items, such as brownies, fudge, cookies, bars, snack bags of mixed pretzels, M and Ms, peanuts, chex mix, and any other items you want to add, cupcakes, muffins, or any other finger foods. You can leave them at the church before 3:00 Friday, June 6th, and I will pick them up. I will stay until 3:30 for people to drop off items if you do not have a church key.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY REPORT

Important Update: Transition to Servant Keeper Online Giving Platform

I am following up on my general announcement published in the May newsletter with specifics about the church's transition to a new online giving service. The new upgraded platform is pretty easy to navigate when setting up a one-time or recurring donation. The new "Donate" button and a QR Code have already been added to the church website and are "live." Additional "Special" buttons will be added in the future for Outreach activities and special occasions.

We recognize the current increasing trend for supporting causes through online donations and offer this platform as a secure way to donate to the church if you're unable to visit in person. If you don't wish to set up an account, you can make your donation(s) as a "Guest".

What You Need to Know – 5 easy steps:

Step 1: Visit our church website: www.lisbonumchurch.org

Step 2: Click or scan the new black "Donate" button and QR Code (you can't miss them) to activate the link to access our new SKOG platform

Step 3: "Sign on" (to create your new account) OR "Sign In" (once you've created an account)

You will be asked to use the email that is on record with the church directory –

Don't worry if your email isn't found during the search – just fill in the address you wish to use and the funds will be credited to the account with your name

Step 4: Select a fund from the list of options on the very easy-to-use "Main Giving" form for scheduled or one-time donations

Step 5: Check out (follow the prompts to complete the form) and click SUBMIT
