I'm sure many of you have heard the comments "The Moxie Festival isn't what it used to be." Many changes both to the festival and with our own participation have been made, but we have still found ways to move forward. I recently was given the 1996 Moxie Festival Schedule of Events. A Moxie concert was held by the Lisbon Community Band, a pancake breakfast by the Masonic Lodge, carnival games and rides sponsored by the Lisbon Area Business Association, cultural bake sale held at the S.S. Cyril's Church, Granny's Attic at the Holy Family Church, the Lisbon Falls Fire Co. held an auction and car wash, the Knights of Columbus held a chicken barbecue, a dunk tank was set up by Lisbon Emergency, Crosman's Funeral Home sponsored the balloon zoo, bingo was held at the American Legion Post #66, a duck race was sponsored by the Lisbon Rotary Club, Cooper's Cloggers and Countryside Dancers performed during the day. 
