One of the daily readings in the Advent devotional which Sue and Harvey White shared as a gift for our church family focused on words of Scripture which we recently read during one of our times of worship:

*Therefore, brothers and sisters, you must be patient as you wait for the coming of the Lord. Consider the farmer who waits patiently for the coming of rain in the fall and spring, looking forward to the precious fruit of the earth. You also must wait patiently, strengthening your resolve, because the coming of the Lord is near.*  
- James 5.7-8

Devotional author Jan Turrentine shared this story:

“Well into her senior years, my grandmother kept a vegetable garden. She prepared the soil, planted the seeds, watered the plants, pulled weeds, and faithfully waited. There were no shortcuts, no workarounds. She did her back-breaking job using only hand tools and then waited as the seeds, soil, water, and sun did theirs. Her patient waiting was rewarded with a beautiful harvest.

Once she planted those seeds, she could have walked away. But she didn’t. She tended to the plants daily until harvest time, trusting the God whose hand guided the entire process. She waited with patience, but also with decisive actions. She couldn’t do God’s job, but she could participate in the process by doing hers.”

As the new year dawns upon us with its 365 days of promise, we are reminded with this story that patiently, actively waiting is not just a way of life for the Advent season. Yes, we just celebrated the coming of Jesus as a baby born in a Bethlehem manger but, as our faith journeys continue, we celebrate each day in the ways we live that Christ will come again to usher in God’s amazing, abundant Kingdom.

Patiently, actively waiting means – as Turrentine’s grandmother did – that we do our part as God’s does God’s part for us. God fills our lives with gifts, showers us with God’s grace, and walks with us every step of the way. We are called to be aware of all that God bestows and use it to the best of our ability – whether that means times of quiet reflection or times of caring for others.

## OUTREACH COMMITTEE

December is a busy month for the Outreach Committee. We donated snacks to the collection held at Breakfast with Santa, which will be donated to the local schools. 149 individual snacks were donated. Again this year it was voted to collect gift cards to be given to the patrons of the Drop-In Center in Auburn. Their center provides services to the unhoused population. Outreach has also again been able to work with local schools to help provide for Christmas dinner for families that the school identifies. We gave 12 turkeys as well as carrots. We were also able to have 15 5 pound bags of potatoes donated from Bell Farms. Ron Wills donated two family camperships to Camp Mechuwanna for two mothers and their two children for the November family weekend camp. This year we filled 7 fruit baskets for 8 individuals.

At our recent meeting it was voted to send \$1200 to Warm They Neighbors with a request that it go to a Lisbon resident.

We thank Ella Mae for working with us this year and will miss her input.

As pastors and leaders within a cooperative parish, your presence—and the presence of your congregations—would be a meaningful expression of our connectional ministry. I would be grateful if you would share this invitation widely and encourage participation from across our churches.

The breakfast is free and open to all, reflecting our commitment to removing financial barriers and ensuring that this remains a truly civic and communal event. If you or members of your congregation plan to attend, we welcome RSVPs so that we may plan hospitality accordingly.

Thank you for your faithful leadership and for the ways you continue to embody grace, courage, and justice in our shared ministry. I look forward to standing alongside you as we honor Dr. King's legacy and live more fully into the Beloved Community together.
